"Warning Signs of a Spiritually Abusive Church/Ministry." -Mable Dunbar

1. Charismatic/Authoritative /Narcissistic Leadership Style:

Don't talk, don't trust outsiders, don't think and don't question.

2. Rigid Compulsive Rules and Roles:

Emphasis is placed on uniformity rather than unity. There are prescribed rules and roles that everyone must follow and maintain in order to "belong" and be "accepted."

3. Isolationism:

In the spiritually abusive church or ministry there is fragmentation. There is a feeling of isolation and a lack of protection.

4. Feelings, Thoughts, Opinions are Suppressed or Ignored:

There is a lack of tolerance for disagreement with leadership.

5. Secrets.

Secrecy is always a hallmark of a spiritually abusive church or ministry.

6. Financial Coercion:

Spiritually abusive church and/or ministries tend to guilt, force, shame, or threaten members into giving money with little or no accountability. They ignore what Paul says in 2 Corinthians 9:7, NIV) "Each of you should give what you have decided in your heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver."

7. Selectivity/Elitism.

People are selected to serve in the spiritually abusive church or ministry based upon their family name (connection), socio-economic background, gender, profession, race, culture, or social affiliation.

8. Spiritual Superiority.

This is an attitude among members that "we are superior to all other churches / ministries because of our understanding of the Bible."

9. Emphasizes Protecting the Image of the Church Rather than the Well-being of Victims.

When abuse occurs rather than following the law and best practices (reporting it to local police and / or social services), a spiritually abusive church/ministry will want to keep the abuse quiet under the guise of handling it "biblically." Victims and their families are mandated to remain silent about their pain and suffering in order to protect the image of the church.

"GOD IS ABLE AND CAPABLE OF PROTECTING THE IMAGE OF HIS CHURCH!" The greatest fallout of spiritual abuse is that it misrepresents God's character and government.

God is not the source of spiritual abuse.

The source of spiritual abuse is Satan, the enemy of our souls, and flawed, broken humanity.

Through prayer, counsel, transparency, confession, surrender and forgiveness, healing can be realized in a spiritually abusive Church, religious institution, relationship or ministry.

How To Prevent Spiritual Abuse: Individual Response (Adapted from Source Unknown) (What You Can Do)

If you want to be a part of the solution to end spiritual abuse, you must help those who are abused or mistreated and those who can't even conceive that there is a problem with mistreatment or spiritual abuse. Understand that that the cycle of spiritual abuse involves both perpetrators as well as victims. Anyone can be spiritually abused or abusive.

- If you do something unloving, admit your wrongdoing and make amends to those you wronged.
- You need to understand that abuse flourishes in spiritually abusive Christian/Religious organization because people
 who work for the church or ministry will not tell you about their abuse. If they did they would probably have to
 leave the church or ministry. Leaving isn't an easy option, especially to those with children, limited support or
 career options, or those who believe they are working for the Lord.
- If you are friends with, or loyal to someone accused of mistreating others, and you yourself have not been mistreated, look at the allegations objectively. **Do you love the truth more than your friend?**
- Do not condemn those who report mistreatment. What kind of church or ministry culture are we creating, when the mistreated or abused are ostracized for reporting it?
- Do not minimize or underestimate how hurtful and damaging spiritual abuse is to people and to a church or ministry. Those who have been mistreated or abused by individuals in positions of spiritual authority often suffer terrible damage and scars that can stay with them for years, perhaps even for life. They can experience a sense of loss, equivalent to bereavement; they can have feelings of disappointment with God and even a crisis of faith. They might not return to church; they might remain isolated from friends, members, social activities. They may even suffer from depression, trauma, psychosomatic illnesses, or have feelings of inadequacy, and rationalize that they have failed as a Christian and therefore give up hope of salvation.

Church/Ministry Leadership Response (adapted from Source Unknown)

1. Encourage Freedom of Expression, Thoughts and Opinions:

In every church and ministry there needs to be a willingness for leadership to genuinely listen to their members so that the members can feel safe to express their honest opinions and ideas in regard to their church/ministry

2. Insist on Accountability Measures, Policies and Guidelines:

A major part of preventing spiritual abuse from occurring in a church or ministry is to encourage systems of accountability in place for everyone in leadership positions. No leader (or elite group of leaders) should be allowed to have unquestioned power, authority and control over church/ministry decisions policies or finances.

3. Training and Education:

Church staff and lay leaders need to be regularly trained in spiritual abuse awareness, just as secular companies train employees about the dynamics of domestic violence, sexual harassment and discrimination.

4. Provide Safety and Protection for Those who Report:

It takes a great amount of courage for someone to bring matters of spiritual abuse to the leadership. These individuals need to be protected and validated for their courage while reports and/or allegations are being investigated. They need to be treated with dignity and respect, love and support; not condemned, criticized or ostracized.

5. Practice Confidentiality:

It is of the utmost importance that individuals who report spiritual abuse are able to trust that their concerns or private conversations will be kept confidential until appropriate investigation, policies and procedures are carried out.

6. Lovingly Confront:

Lovingly confront those who may appear to be sincere in their Christian faith, yet abusive. We must **not** call Christian love, when really in essence, is abuse. **How can we help to save others while we are hurting them?**

Those who are held up to represent God, "to bind up the broken, to proclaim liberty to the captives and set at liberty them that are bruised," -lsaiah 66:1 and Luke 4:18, should not be used by the enemy to do the opposite. They should be at the forefront combatting spiritual abuse on any and every level of church/ministry operations and government.

Hunger Facts, Spokane, WA

The U.S. has a huge problem with food; one in every nine Americans currently struggle with hunger, many of whom are children. Our country's safety net is also notoriously shallow, forcing some to choose between rent or groceries during rocky times. This doesn't mean that we don't have enough food – we waste 40% of all food produced. It means it's just not going to the right people.

Spokane County is no exception, with 14% of residents and 20% of children being food-insecure. Food insecurity, defined by Second Harvest, means that a person does not know where their next meal will come from. With the huge rise of unemployment from the pandemic, even more people are facing hunger alongside bills, healthcare costs, and growing anxieties from ongoing uncertainty.
